Station news

KOREA (South): KBS World Radio's German service gave details of the 2025 Audience survey in its mailbag show on Friday night. 2,315 listeners from 83 countries took part, 112 of them were from German-speaking regions (this usually refers to Austria, Germany and Switzerland). The German-speaking participants also gave the service in their language the best marks, with 93 of 100 points.

Most listeners (61.1 per cent) showed a particular interest in news and information from South Korea, which makes the news (1), and "Kreuz und Quer durch Korea" (2) a program that corresponds with the French-service "Séoul au Jour le Jour" and the Mandarin service's "jīnrì shǒu'ěr". The mailbag program came in third among the German-speaking listeners who gave feedback.

K-pop music fared less well among them, while globally, programs focused on K-pop ranks second, only behind news and information.

The share of shortwave users among the global audience dropped for the third consecutive year. It had been at 36 per cent among the 2023 respondents (i. e. 623 swls), at 31.4 per cent in 2024, and is now at 23.8 per cent (551 swls).

On the other hand, the total number of survey participants rose for the third consecutive year, from 1,730 in 2023 to 2,315 this year.

Despite the drop in shortwave listeners, continued use of shortwave has been recommended, because in some regions (including the German-speaking ones), it continues to be the main listener's choice.

Among the global participating audience, 46.2 per cent listened to the KBS homepage streaming, and the share of app users was 23.2 per cent. (Franz Bleeker)

NEW LOGGING UI

By the way, there is a joint development project with Günter Lorenz of MWLIST/FMLIST and the Finnish DX Association to improve the "logging UI" of these two station databases. Search functionality is almost complete now, Creation of new logs is planned but not there yet. https://dxing.fi/dev/

What you can do now with thei tool is to search through all logs made with MWLIST or FMLIST. When you log in with your MWLIST/FMLIST credentials and hit enter, you will by default see your own logs from the last 12 months. Then you can either narrow down the search or widen it to other DXer's loggings. You can also modify your existing logs with it. As mentioned, the project is still a work in progress, but it can already serve as a helpful aid for IQ analysis, for example when using WavViewDX.

I just got this tip on my A-DX mailing list that I should disable harmless files in Windows Defender because it scans "everything". I just disabled .wav and it's incredible!

HISTORY is displayed again within a second, it's clearly this Defender in W11! It's so much faster, almost like with an SSD! This tip is certainly also helpful in Windows 10. The setting is a minor detail, but it will certainly be helpful for many people.

IRC discontinued as of 31 December 2026

End of a chapter, start of a legacy - the international reply coupon enters the history books, UPU, 15.12.2025

15 December (Berne, Switzerland) – Since its introduction on 1 October 1907, the international reply coupon (IRC) has accompanied generations of correspondents, travellers and collectors across the world. Serving as a truly universal paper currency, it enables the holder to pay for postage of an unregistered international airmail letter between the UPU's 192 member countries.

For almost 120 years and across 10 successive models, the IRC has embodied the values of universality, fairness and solidarity upon which the universal postal service is founded.

On 17 September 2025, at the 28th Universal Postal Congress in Dubai (United Arab Emirates), the UPU member countries decided, with a view to adapting and simplifying the universal services, to discontinue the IRC as of 31 December 2026. This decision is a natural progression within the broader transformation of international postal services, in alignment with the digital practices and modern outlook of their customers.

The UPU International Bureau is proud to provide support in this transition and is currently working towards the IRC's transformation into a part of the UPU's heritage, in keeping with its history and unique role in global postal cooperation. IRCs will remain valid and available for sale by and exchange with the designated operators of UPU member countries until 31 December 2026.

Lastly, in celebration of the exceptional legacy of the IRC, a special commemorative product will be released. Tracing the history of the IRC and offering an unprecedented customer experience, this product will honour this iconic page in the history of philately and the UPU.

SSD Storage

Back then, C60 or, even better, C90 cassettes were used for recording. Later, when the first SDR receivers appeared, the "hard drive" couldn't be big enough. These mechanically fragile, relatively slow, but cheap HDDs are now being replaced by affordable SSDs.

Therefore, my station computer is now getting a Samsung 990 PRO NVMe M.2 SSD with 4 terabytes of storage and sequential read/write speeds of up to 7,450 MB/s and 6,900 MB/s, respectively, to massively accelerate the large amounts of data involved in recording and monitoring the medium wave band. The two additional 8 TB HDDs will continue to be used for archiving.

The price development of these SSDs is also interesting. For months, 4TB SSDs were available for just under or around €300. When I bought mine BEFORE (!) the whole Black Friday scam, it cost €267. By Black Friday, it was almost €300, and now the price of the identical SSD has climbed to nearly €400. I suspect it will stay there for a while due to the global storage shortage—the manufacturers have to make a profit, after all...

My favourite station on Shortwave is Radio New Zealand Pacific by Clint Gouveia, M0OXF

My favourite station on Shortwave is Radio New Zealand Pacific - formerly Radio New Zealand International of course. Along with ABC before they closed down on shortwave, I would spend much of my time listening to their content - much more so than other stations on the HF bands. With ABC Northern Territories, the task of hearing them was of course much more difficult and required a better antenna, lower QRM environment and a decent receiver. I spent many months monitoring their broadcast frequencies until one day I finally succeeded.

I learnt very quickly that the only material way of increasing my signal-to-noise on the shortwave bands was to get out of the ubiquitous levels of QRM. So, I used to either cycle or drive to a local, secluded wood a couple of miles from my house. I even visited this place in the dead of night on more than one occasion - but I always took the Labrador for protection lol. I can still clearly remember copying both ABC Northern Territories signals for the first time on 120 metres - on 2325 kHz and 2485 kHz. It was the highlight of my DXing career at that point! I was using my Sony ICF-2001D at the time (what else?!) and a random long wire, which for some reason I had clipped to the telescopic antenna. It was a brilliant mo-



ment and of course one that I recorded for my Oxford Shortwave Log YouTube channel. See the attached image - a screenshot from that reception video. As I said, it was impossible to hear either signal indoors and heaven knows I tried - but the local QRM was just too bad, raising my noise-floor significantly and drowning out just about any modulation. I could, however, hear ABC on 60 metres at their well-known 4865 kHz frequency.

I would also listen to Radio New Zealand International as a kid on my Amstrad 6011 multi-band receiver and again when I got back into shortwave DXing in 2015. I finally copied them again at the end of October 2015 on my Sangean ATS-803A receiver, on 9700 kHz. That reception made me very happy and once again, it happened out in the 'DX woods' as I used phrase that location for my YouTube subscribers. Once described as the best budget shortwave radio of all time by a friend of mine, my example of the ATS-803A had been in the garden shed for about 20 years before I decided to root it

out 10 years ago. The internals were rusted and the wiring to the battery compartment had all but disintegrated, but I got my soldering iron out and managed to wire the battery terminals straight on to the mains power board and hey presto it sparked back into life. However, time and the damp environment in the shed meant that the radio didn't stop corroding and although I managed to extract a few more years of life out of it, eventually it died again and I threw it away.

Nowadays, I still listen to Radio New Zealand pacific a lot, but I tend to use one of my desktop rigs and more often than not, my Icom IC-R8600. A couple of weeks ago, I spent an hour or two enjoying their output on the Icom with the addition of my Bose SoundLink Mini 2 speaker to help enhance the audio. I find their signal on 13755 kHz improves later in the morning UK time and if I'm working from home, NRZP is often on in the background. Long may they continue on shortwave!

Instead of greetings, data theft!

Dangerous attachments are disguised as images, animations, or video files. Simply open one of these "greetings" and the scammers will gain access to your banking information and personal data.

Be vigilant: sometimes attackers fake avatars or send messages from hacked accounts of your friends.

How to protect yourself: - Do not open files and links from unknown senders, even if they promise a "gift."

- If a message from a friend seems strange (for example, they offer to download an archive), contact them personally and confirm the details before doing anything.
- Use antivirus software and keep your smartphone and computer operating systems up to date.

Remember: the closer the holidays get, the more active the scammers become. Be on guard! (https://vk.com/obyasnyaemrf)



SAQ Christmas Eve message

The SAQ Christmas Eve message on **December 24th** is sent from Sweden's historic <u>Grimeton Radio Station</u> using the massive Alexanderson alternator (callsign SAQ) on 17.2 kHz CW (Morse Code), a tradition continuing for over 100 years to send greetings worldwide, with live streams and QSL opportunities available online.

On December 1st 1924, the 200kW Alexanderson alternator with the call sign "SAQ" was put into commercial operation with telegram traffic from Sweden to the United States. 101 years later, the transmitter is the only remaining electro-mechanical transmitter from this era and is still in running condition. On Christmas Eve morning, **Wednesday December 24th 2025**, the transmitter is scheduled* to spread the traditional Christmas message to the whole World, on 17.2 kHz CW.




DX nostalgia by RFK

Christmas is coming soon. I'm sure most of us DXers have some fond memories of the Holidays when we spent some time after the festivities in front of our receivers at night. I can still recall many stations that I picked up around Christmas. One station which came in loud and clear on Xmas Eve 1972 was La Voz de Honduras on 5875 kHz. Of course I sent a reception report but I never got a reply. This was the only time I was able to log this station. Still, I treasure the memory of this night as something very special as this reception was so unexpected. Their signal was very good and the music played very enjoyable. Actually, some LA stations in the tropical bands used to be heard with better strength in winter than in summertime. One good example was Radio Colosál of Colombia which could be heard each and every morning with a killer signal on 4945 kHz. For some reason they were never so strong during other seasons.


Many Asian stations were also often heard around Christmas. Knut Ivarsson picked up Radio Malaya on New Year's Eve in 1948. The station was set up in 1946 by The Pan-Malayan Department of Broadcasting which was dedicated to providing radio services to Singapore and Malaya. At the time the two territories were politically separated. After the Japanese Occupation ended in 1945, broadcasting was for a time under the control of the British Military Administration until the return of civilian rule in April 1946. The QSL card does not indicate which frequency Knut was listening to but I suppose it was one of their shortwave outlets. Later SW broadcasts would be heard from the territories of Sabah, Sarawak and Singapore which became independent in 1957. Singapore became an independent nation in 1965.



The beautiful Quetzal bird QSL card was used by La Voz de Guatemala for many decades and Knut Ivarsson received this card in 1948.




Here is one more from Knut Ivarsson's collection. Lahti of Finland was maybe most known for its mighty longwave station but they also broadcast on SW. The card shows their 15 kW transmitter.



In the late 1940s/early 1950s SIRA of Buenos Aires broadcast in Swedish and one of the purposes of these programmes was marketing Argentina as a tourist destination. Knut Ivarsson received this QSL card in 1950 for a report of their transmissions in Swedish.



Finally Knut's QSL card from La Voz del Yuna of the Dominican Republic. The station was owned by the brother of the dictator Rafael Trujillo, José Arismendi Trujillo. In 1950 the station became the official station of the nation and changed its name to La Voz Dominicana.
