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Taldom transmitter working on 261 kHz

Taldom transmitter is a large broadcasting facility for shortwave and longwave near Taldom, Russia. Its longwave transmitter working on 261 kHz is with a power of 2500 Kilowatt world's most powerful broadcasting station and receivable in whole Europe at nighttimes (if Russian authorities did not forget to pay the electricity bill).

There are two aerial systems for longwave at Taldom. One consists of mutiple guyed masts with a height of 257 metres, the other consists of at least 4 guyed masts with a height of 275 metres arranged in a circle and a mast in the centre of the circle.

INDIA: Finally, a very nice f/d 'View of Five Rathas' QSL card in exactly 6 months from New Delhi confirming my reception of **AIR Panaji (GOA)** for an e-mail reception report to S. Jayarman, Supt. Eng. concerning their requests for reports from that site back in January. I sent his copy of the e-mail via snail-mail (which he could not confirm as the program originated in New Delhi) to New Delhi. The card was signed by V. K. Sharma with all of the pertinent information for 11740 kHz @ 15,30 to 15.45 UTC in a black 'Sharpie' pen. However, written in blue underneath was the additional frequency of 9820 kHz with an indecipherable signature near the other. I've been after AIR Panaji for about 11 years. C/V #223 per NASWA. (Terry Palmersheim, KC7LDP via HCDX)

RUSSIA: Special Radio, 1800-1900 UTC, 6240 kHz, Thursdays only. Special Radio is an international corporate Internet project of musicians and contemporary art activists. Special Radio was organized on December 1, 2001 by a group of Russian independent music publishers' representatives. Special Radio is a unique project in the sphere of Internet radio: radio broadcast time is more than 30,000 hours. Freedom of music choice offered by Special Radio to its audience can't be compared with any other radio station. No FM radio station can offer such variety of music material. Radio music content is formatted to different channels (buttons) and consists of stream broadcast of 32 audio and 5 video channels. Besides 2 channels content which can be presented on FM stations, there are 13 channels which have no analogs and are really impossible on FM radio stations.

Special Radio is the only radio which works with Russian and foreign musicians regardless of their career success in other mass media. Special Radio program is composed by musicians who offer their tracks for rotation. Special Radio is the largest center of music of different styles in Russia. Besides Internet, Special Radio programs are relayed in 7 European countries, 10 Asian countries, Brazil, the USA and Canada. Special Radio daily audience is more than million people. Every day 10,000 people visit the site.

VIETNAM [non]. Test broadcasts from **Little Saigon Radio**, which Bernd Trutenau reported were being transmitted from Taiwan, have been noted here on 11840 from 1138 to 1150 on 22 June. At 1138, Viet music was being played; 1145 brief announcement in Vietnamese referring to Little Saigon Radio, then music resumed. At 1149, Radio Little Saigon [sic] was clearly mentioned. SIO at tune in 333, improved rapidly to 444 before noise reduced to 433 late in the period (T. C. Patterson, Cebu City, Philippines, HCJB DX Partyline July 2, notes by gh for DX LISTENING DIGEST) Previous report said 11540 - which one is a typo?? I couldn't find either mentioned on their Vietnamese website (gh, DXLD)

Updated Africa on Shortwave surveys

- 1) Country order - this comprehensive list covers all known domestic and external short wave broadcasts from Africa as well as selected opposition/target broadcasts aimed at African countries.
- 2) Frequency order - this lists domestic stations in sub-Saharan Africa as well as most opposition/target broadcasts aimed at Africa. It also includes international broadcasts relayed from transmitters in Africa on the Tropical bands.
