DX-ingen ligger fortfarande tyvärr helt nere. Nu är det ju litet uppåt i veckoslutet enligt vad jag kunnat läsa från mail, men då lägger jobbet hinder i vägen. Hela lördagen ryker i princip (V75-trav) och efter det flera timmars skrivjobb. Och så var det kört...

Får glädja mig åt efter efterlängtat QSL **AIR Leh 4760** med kort. V/s Sharma. En station som varit på "most wanted" listan länge, men gäckt mig. I höstas åkte den dock dit en eftermiddag. Och nu kom alltså QSL-et.

**Kurt Norlin:** Jag har inte speciellt mycket att komma med denna gång heller då bandmanglingen från PAX 53 tar upp det mesta av dx-tiden. Jag hade ju runt 300 timmar inspelat och det tar sin tid att gå igenom.

Endast ett KV-QSL denna gång. Det är **WADR**, West Africa Democracy Radio 12000 som sände E-mail-svar. MV-QSL kommer dock regelbundet främst från USA.

Fick nyligen ett infall att titta på SWB:s medlemspresentationer och kunde konstatera att min och många andras är i behov av uppdatering. Detta gör att jag bifogar en uppdatering av min.

*"Min senaste arbetsplats var Skellefteå Museum, där jag var i ett flertal år. Tyvärr är ekonomin ett stort problem inom museivärlden och för något år sedan fanns inga pengar för det projekt jag sysslat med varför jag inte länge kunde fortsätta. Något nytt arbete har inte dykt upp sedan dess.*

*Min "DX-karriär" kan delas upp i två faser eller egentligen tre. Den första startade i februari 1959, när jag som en femtonårig yngling rapporterade The Voice of Tangier och räckte till 1966. Den utfördes med vanliga "bordspysar", vilket var det vanliga då. År 1966 köpte jag min första "trafikare", en RCA AR-88D som snabbt efterföljdes av en Elektromekano M-97. AR-88:an såldes snart och när jag i början av 1970-talet dumt nog sålde även M-97:an kom jag in i en längre aktivitetsperiod p.g.a. avsaknaden av mottagare. Jag hade då 166 länder verifierade.*

*1981 fick jag vid besök hos TBV i Mysen en liten tändande gnista och 1982 startade senaste fasen och nu har jag 231 länder och ca 2000 stationer verifierade. Målsättningen för 2006 är att få Tonga verifierad. Jag var för några år sedan nära att ta amatörcertifikat men jag gjorde inget prov hos provföretare då sjukdom kom emellan. Jag har dock inte lämnat amatörradion helt. Kanske jag gör ett ryck och avlägger*

prov för certifikat. CW-kravet är ju slopat nu, varför det är en aning lättare. DX-ingen här hemma sker i regel på en NRD-mottagare och en Kenwood TS-850S.

Jag har sällan mer än två mottagare på skrivbordet samtidigt.

Dessutom har jag kvar R-392:an jag köpte 1982. Den är igång kanske en gång per år, bl.a. i mellandagarna 1998 vid en minixpedition till RFB utanför Boden, då jag hörde ett 10-tal Puerto Rico stationer. Under många år skedde DX-ingen mest vid klubbens stuga i Rönnbäcken 3 km utanför stan där det fanns fina KV-antennerna och även tre Beverages, som jag hade satt upp. P.g.a skogsavverkning 2003 plockades Beverage-antennerna ner för att troligen aldrig sättas upp igen. Under andra delen av 1990-talet gav dock expeditionerna till Mertajärvi klart mest.

Tyvär även förfrysningsskador vid antennarbeten i -30 C. Sista åren har DX-ingen mest utförts under expeditioner i Parkalompolo. Det är underbart att jacka in mottagarna på permanenta antenner och ej behöva ta ner dem före hemresan.

Här hemma har jag endast en Delta-loop antenn, som kanske skall kompletteras med någon annan antenn även om störningsnivån numera är alldeles för hög här. Jag har under de senaste 20 åren skaffat följande mottagare: JRC NRD-525, NRD-515, NRD-535D, NRD-545, Icom R-75 och Palstar R-30 och samtliga finns fortfarande i min ägo. Jag tycker det är nästan lika skoj med mottagare som att lyssna. Mina besök hos KB har varit verkliga högtidsstunder".

**BOLIVIA.** Estimado Glenn, Hoy pude escucharla la ID de **R. Logos en 6165:**

22/Mar. 2006, 1045-1058 UT escuchado con programa en Guarany (de R. Transmundial con ID), ID "Ud. escucha R. Logos en 6165 kHz desde Santa Cruz de la Sierra, Bolivia", 1100 programa "Mensaje a la Conciencia".

22/Mar. 2006, 1803 UT, relay de HCJB con noticias, música religiosa. Señal baja, bien inferior a R. Santa Cruz, creo que están con 1 kW. 73 (Rogildo F.Aragão, Quillacollo, Bolivia, DXLD)

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Excellent! First known DX report of R. Logos. The HCJB relay would be the ALAS satellite net feed (gh, DXLD)

**GABON. Africa Número Un.** Not sure if this has been observed and reported before. At about 1445 UT today, Tuesday March 21, I checked 17630 for Africa Número Un and for the "wandering African music jammer" which was on 17685 today. Both frequencies were in parallel with the same music. I had two radios on, side by side, to be sure about it. This continued to 1503 when there was silence for a few seconds on 17630 followed by news in French and normal programming. Meanwhile 17685 continued until 1530 with the usual music. So this leaves no doubt that the music on the "jammer" is from Gabon (Bernie O'Shea, Ottawa, Ontario, DXLD)

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Good work! First such confirmation I know of what we have long suspected (gh, DXLD)

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Extremely interesting! Thank you. This also leaves a couple of questions unanswered: for instance, who pays for this jamming? And why does Gabon agree? 73, (Erik Kjøie, Copenhagen, DXLD)

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I doubt that Gabon as a country cares, or even knows, as the facility is essentially a French entity. Ask why FRANCE agrees (gh, DXLD)

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Nothing more than a confirmed surprise that was forwarded weeks ago. I pointed out that this could be possible in the sense that ANO site has more than one transmitter. What happened this time is that they were caught in their own trap (or game) by mistake. Who pays for this jamming? That's our next task to find out. And Gabon is involved in this is just because someone is paying for transmitter time from them, I'd guess. Business is business, after all (Raúl Saavedra, Costa Rica, DXLD)

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Two transmitters have recently been operating during the Clandestine transmission - ANO on 17630 and the Afro-Cuban music on whatever 17 MHz channel is in use on that day. ANO 17630 has been heard on air at 0700 and until c1557. It still goes off for about 30 minutes or so around 1030 to around 1100 and I assume this is because it moves to 21820 to carry NHK programmes in Italian and Swedish. But after then there is no break until final close.

I'm not sure what time the Afro-Cuban music starts but I hear it before the Clandestine goes off c1400. Hearing this in parallel with ANO is very good monitoring - sooner or later something occurs to give away the identity of stations like this.

I agree with Glenn and Raul that using Gabon facilities will be a business deal and not a political one. And obviously "someone" has been coordinating the jamming. I don't know the name of the French Foreign Affairs minister, or even the head of the French equivalent of the CIA, but they might know something about it. 73 (Noel R. Green, UK, dxldyg via DXLD)

**MOZAMBIQUE. 7135, R Terra Verde,** Maputo, partial-data e-mail verie in basic English in 32 weeks, V/S Florentino Escova (Director). QTH: [flordosares@hotmail.com](mailto:flordosares@hotmail.com) RTV was last heard on 7135 during the 2005 Easter, and obviously their broadcasts did not last more than a few days. In fact from the program content at the time I gathered that they have been on SW for only a day or two. In his e-mail to me Mr. Florentino Escova, the station's director, mentioned that they would like to carry on with SW broadcasts, but their relevant transmitter is currently broken and they do not know where to have it repaired. He also enquired about the possibility of having it fixed in South Africa. Not knowing the make or any other details of the transmitter, in fact not knowing anything about transmitters in general, I referred him to the Economic Office of the S. African High Commissioner in Maputo. He said he would contact them and let me know the results. He reiterated that they would like to return to SW as they had good response to their last year's SW broadcast from every province in Mozambique and from virtually every southern African country (Vashek Korinek, RSA in DXplorer via DSWCI DX Window March 22 via DXLD)

**PAPUA NEW GUINEA. RADIO SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS GOES OFF AIR.**

THE Southern Highlands provincial radio station, NBC Nek bilong Muruk, has been off air for three weeks now.

Disgruntled landowners from Longo and Kave, just outside Mendi town, forced the radio station close on March 3 over a K1 million compensation demand for the land on which the transmitter is located. They are also demanding payment from the provincial government for a road maintenance contract that was never honoured. The work was carried out in their area.

An NBC staff told The National in Mendi last Saturday that the landowners confronted them on March 3 and forced the staff to stop broadcasting until their demand was met by Governor Hami Yawari. The staff member, who requested anonymity, said when station manager Andrew Meles and provincial administrator Brian Pebo went to talk to the villagers to resolve the matter, the landowners presented Mr Pebo with a petition and were adamant that they be paid the money before they allow the station to go back on air.

Mr Pebo is understood to have briefed Mr Yawari about the matter but nothing positive has transpired. The NBC staff said that many listeners complained because they were missing out on news and other programmes (The National, PNG, March 27 via DXLD) WTFK? 3275!

- TUNISIA: changed to DST (UTC +2h) on 26 Mar (observes now regular DST each year) DST = Daylight Saving [sic] Time (Bernd Trutenau, Lithuania, via Steve Whitt, MWC via dXLD)

### Replacing Drake R8B mechanical encoder with optical

I've replaced the mechanical encoder on my Drake R8B twice now, and again it's starting to act up. The mechanical encoders are prone to failure. Is it possible to replace the encoder or encoder board with the optical version used in the earlier R8's? Has anyone attempted this or have any advice to offer? (Thanks Desinguy)

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FYI, optical encoders wear out, too. I had to have my Icom's optical encoder repaired... (bob k5qwg)

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It's possible to install an optical encoder but IMO, not worth the effort. The mechanical encoder will last longer if you take it apart, thoroughly clean the wheel/contacts and relube it with a synthetic grease. I did this on a new encoder and it's lasted more than three years so far. It has to be done before the encoder starts acting up.

BTW- Have you tried the new encoder with a metal shaft? It's supposed to be more reliable. What model year is your R8B? (HFGuy)

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The optical encoders that I have seen on some of the Kenwood stuff is basically junk.... nothing more than a flimsily attached acetate wheel. Now, if you purchase a good Bourns, Oak-Grisby, or Grayhill encoder it will last many years or even decades. Figure about 30 to 100 dollars for a good encoder.

In order to pull this off, you need to remove the pullup resistors from the input lines to the uP. Next, you need to connect a 5VDC source to the power connection on the optical encoder, and also remove any steering diodes from the A and B channel lines. After this is done, connect the appropriate outputs of the encoder to the uP inputs and you are set to go. Figure about an hour job. (Pete KE9OA)

### **WRTH and me**

**I was on the World Radio and TV Handbook web site** the other day, while thinking about the WRTH, I thought back to my first use of the book and how it illustrated how "addicted" to SWLing I was.

I first encountered WRTH is the early 1970's, I think via the library at the Electrical Engineering Dept at Imperial College in London. I guess I could not afford to buy the book back then, because, from that moment, every time I went it to a library or bookstore I always checked to see if they had a copy of WRTH (Usually "no") .

A serious sign of radio-listening preoccupation (a symptom of addiction) was when I visited the USA for the first time (NYC). The first thing I did after getting off the plane was scan the radio dial, the second thing was to head to a large bookstore and look for WRTH. I had noticed , in the UK, that WRTH was published by Doubleday (if my memory is correct), so I went to a Doubleday book store. Alas, no WRTH.

Eventually I moved to the USA. A few years later , I visted Washington DC. Now, the average person visiting Washington for the first time heads for the White House or Capitol Building, right? Not me. I had heard about the Library of Congress, and was told it held every book published in the USA. So my first stop was at the Library of Congress, a huge serious looking place with book shelves seemingly up to the ceiling. It was true, they did have every book published...INCLUDING WRTH. So , while first visitors to Washington are usually touring the White House, I was scribbling down frequencies to try, and reading radio receiver reviews!

I eventually settled in the DC area, a short distance from a store that stocked the WRTH (EEB). I don't know if other radio enthusiasts read that book the way I did? I would read every page, hundreds of time. After reading the important things like new receiver reviews, The BBC WS listings, and some of the new trend articles, I would read every page on every listed country. There were times, when I had read everything else, that I would read just the sections about how many radio or TV sets there were in each country. Remember the countries that had no TV stations , no TVs, and maybe just a couple hundred radios? After doing that a few times, I would sometimes just read the station addresses ,look at the station manager's name and imagine what it might be like to be Mr. Manunga Guzumba in whateverland.

So, while I seem to recall never really being able to afford the book, when I did spend the \$\$\$\$ waht a bargain . I can't imagine a book with more cents-to-page value. Looking back, I can't figure out why I never just ordered the book rather than go to bookstores in every city I visited hoping they would have it. Now, in the age of Amazon.com and Internet publishing, the info found in WRTH is readily accessible. It is rather nostalgic though, thinking back to the days of early WRTH.
