Vashek Korintek: It's time to say thank you for all the effort you put into SWB's. Every issue is interesting AND useful. It's not easy to find all the SW information regularly and in one place. And congratulation to your 51st anniversary. We made it to 55th but sadly my wife has passed away not even a year ago.

Talking of information, it is a pity that many stations with irregular schedules (whether legal ones or pirates) do not publicise their broadcasts well in advance. Most of us read about their broadcasts after the event in the logs of some sort. Of course some do, but they seem to be a minority. I will never understand that someone invests money and time into the equipment and painstakingly compiles a programme and then goes and broadcasts it into a void – hoping that someone will be tuning in at the right time on the right frequency – and so losing majority of potential listeners.

I have some info possibly useful for SWB: For a long time I've been noticing logs of a Russian station on 3940 kHz named "Music Wave Radio". I never managed to hear this ID but the other day I heard "Russkoe Piratskoe Radio" (Russian Pirate Radio) and e-mail address podradio@mail.ru. I sent off a report and the next day came a response from Evgeny Shaden with a QSL and some info: Russian Pirate Radio is indeed the name of the station, "Music Wave Radio" together with "Nostalgic Broadcasts" and "Radio Wagner" are just the titles of the programmes.

My observation is that their programmes are generally biased towards patriotism. Their schedule is Saturday and Sunday 19:00 UTC "until early in the morning". But a while ago, I have also heard them once or twice on Fridays. I'm currently based in Prague and the signal here is usually good, even almost perfect on occasion. They give the transmitter power as 20 kW, which would explain the strength, but they will not disclose even the country where the transmitter is located.

CUBA. Chris Campbell says he got this from his RHC contact today:

``This is the latest information about RHC's shortwave service. As of yesterday, broadcasts resumed from the Nauta {sic: Bauta} Center on transmitters 4 and 5 on frequencies 11760, 15140 and 11950 kHz. We now have programs on shortwave. The 2:00 a.m. English program, which was scheduled to air on 6100 kHz, is now being broadcast on 11760 because there is no antenna for that frequency``

I've yet to see any recent reports of 15140 or 11950 but check for them. /Glenn Hauser, [WOR]

JAPAN. A newsreader formerly employed by a subcontractor of NHK Radio Japan's Chinese service has been fined 11 million Yen, or between 70,000 and 80,000 US dollars, for going off-script on August 19 last year, suggesting that the Senkaku Islands (Diaoyu in Mandarin) belonged to China, and calling on listeners to remember Japanese warcrimes. <https://www.cna.com.tw/news/aopl/202509010176.aspx>

His of-the-cuff remarks had led to one resignation and several cuts in salary among NHK directors.

TAIWAN. Radio Taiwan International's German service gave details about this year's reception reports on the direct shortwave transmissions from Tamsui in July, on 11995 and 15145 kHz, in its Friday's (Sept 12) mailbag program. The test transmission on Saturday, June 28 2025, got 516 reception reports from 27 countries. The regular transmissions during the July weekends got 1,146 reports.

The table underneath only shows statistics for the number of reports on the regular transmissions in July, and only contains reports that included SINPO code (therefore less than 1,146).

Vietnam Plus is a website run by the Vietnam News Agency, the one that turns eighty this year, and they published an article on Friday (September 12) that celebrates this anniversary.

The immediate cause for the article is a statement by the newsagency's party secretary and director Vũ Việt Trang, who "reiterated the Vietnam Newsagency's status as an important newsagency and national newsagency in the new era" in an interview. <https://zh.vietnamplus.vn/article-post247893.vnp>

The article is also available in English, on vietnamnews, a website also run by the VNA, but the article is not as comprehensive as the Chinese version on Vietnam Plus.

Quote VNA: Nearly 260 [VNA employees] gave their lives for the cause of information, and many more carried wounds for the rest of their lives. Some were poisoned by chemical agents, with consequences that still affect their children and grandchildren. End of quote.

That's a reference to all the post-1945 wars, be it those against the French colonial power, the U.S. war, or the Chinese border war in 1979.

Also mentioned is the "Liberation News Agency", the VNA's arm in South Vietnam as of October 12, 1960, as described in more detail by this VNA article published in 2020.

Apparently, the VNA used shortwave for its information services communications until August 19 1998, when they started their website, vnnet.net. If exactly so, this would be one of the examples where the internet killed shortwave right away.

But the stories of VNA and that of the Voice of Vietnam (VoV) can't be written separately. The news agency provided VoV (or its precursor Radio Hanoi) with news to read out and to report, and it also transmitted its international teletype news service on these transmitters, which were located at Me Tri "just outside Hanoi", according to a CIA memorandum compiled in June 1969.



Officially, VoV was established even a few days earlier than VNA, but they went online half a year later than the news agency, in February 1999.

Personal memory, I learned English with the Voice of Vietnam. VoV was the first foreign station I ever found on the radio dial outside VHF/FM, and reception was made easy as they used to broadcast on out-of-band frequencies back then. As a child, I probably listened on 10,040 kHz.

Other radio news

DX using very simple receive set-ups



This past month I have been experimenting with copying DX using very simple receive set-ups - just 6 meters of wire and a portable. I tried this in the garden with the Raddy RF919. I have what you might call a complicated relationship with this radio. I originally purchased a unit last summer and had a couple of issues with it, primarily the battery draining within a couple of days, even if the radio wasn't used. There was also a problem with a loose external antenna socket. These radios aren't particularly cheap and so I returned it to Amazon for a full refund. However, I like the retro styling, and the two full colour display panels are among the best around shortwave portables, so in the end, I gave it another change and bought another one. Testing it in the garden at a friend's house, with a wire antenna only delivered only limited results. The English programming of China Radio International on 15590 kHz was booming in as usual and strong enough to complete drown the QRM. More interesting was copying the interval signal from Turkey "This is the Voice of Türkiye" over and over. It took me back to my days (and

nights) of shortwave listening as a small kid in the 1980s. Great stuff. Unfortunately, all the modern devices we use these days generate an almost ubiquitous 'electro-smog' of noise which makes proper DXing almost impossible without a magnetic loop.

Better results using the same wire antenna with my Eton Satellit Grundig Edition portable were obtained at home, indoors. I had the wire just slung around the curtain pole in my shack and managed to copy the infamous UVB-76 'The Buzzer' channel marker on 4625 kHz, St. Petersburg VOLMET 6617 kHz, Voice of Korea on 12015 kHz and S51DX getting upset with another amateur radio operator on 7184 kHz, among other signals. I'm fortunate to live on the edge of a village in West Oxfordshire with generally very low levels of QRM, which make using an internal antenna viable for copying stronger signals. In noisier environments, it would be mostly impossible to hear very much at all. The Wellbrook ALA1530 magnetic loop antenna and the Bonito/NTi Mega-Loop FX antenna that followed were game changers for me, starting at the end of 2015. Since then, QRM has definitely got worse and will most likely continue to do so. A good quality wideband active magnetic loop makes all the difference and represents a better investment than, for example, buying a higher spec. Receiver. (All the best to you and your readers, good DX and 73. Clint M00XF)

AziLoop comparison



The size of the AziLoop is now 18m per loop, and the feedpoint is 1,35m high.



RUS-DX (Part 2).

The 90s of the last century. New windows of opportunity for contacts with foreign DX publications are opening. Many DX publications did not publish my bulletin in full, but inserted excerpts from the bulletin, which is understandable, since it was possible to choose an interesting message for readers.

Back in 1991, messages about radio broadcasting in Russia could be read on the African continent, in the Nigerian printed publication "DX-AFRIK" (publication of the Africa DX Association) [Editor: Friday I. Okoloise].

Since 1992, I have had friendly relations with the Argentine publication "ONDA CORTA" [Editor: Gabriel Ivan Barrera].

On the American continent in the 90s of the last century there were many DX clubs and publications, but it was impossible for me to cover all of this. I was grateful to everyone who was interested in my publication about radio broadcasting in the USSR and Russia. Only today, decades later, sorting through the remains of my archive, I find much from that time. But many paper publications were lost. Time does not spare and here is paper material that could tell a lot of interesting things about the formation of the English-language publication of today's "RUS-DX". And there was not much free time for pursuing a DX hobby, life is life - you had to work, not forget about your family and there were only a few hours a day left to listen to the air and write letters.

In 1992, I was invited to the annual American publication "Passport To World Band Radio" [Editor-in-Chief Lawrence Magne]. So I became a member of the Editorial Contributors and have been with the publication since 1993, there was a message about this on the pages of the publication. But since the bulletin could not be published in the directory, there was a footnote that the bulletin could be purchased for a certain fee, which included postage. But an exchange of information was organized with "Passport To World Band Radio". The publication was published for 25 years and in 2009 it ceased publication and was closed. I was on the editorial board from 1992 to 2009 inclusive. On the Internet you can look in one of the archives the 2005 edition: "Passport to World Band Radio 2005" - https://archive.org/details/passporttoworldb0000unse_k7p2_2005ed/page/n3/mode/2up

In 1993, information about the Russian bulletin appeared in the Australian edition "OZDX" [Editor: David Martin]. In 1993, contact was established with the bulletin from New Zealand "DXISIMO" [Editor: Paul Ormandy]. In 1997, information from Russia appeared on the pages of the bulletin from the USA - "Numero Uno" [Editor: Jerry Berg"].

Today, after many years, it is impossible to recall all the moments, but it was the heyday of the DX hobby in Russia, the time of the emergence of independent radio stations in Russia and new DX publications in our country. If I kept a diary, it would probably be a multi-volume work on the development of the DX hobby in the USSR and Russia, from the time when there was an unofficial ban on the hobby - listening to foreign radio stations and sending letters with reception reports and how we lived at that time and continued to listen to the radio and write letters, to the time when all bans were lifted and a stormy life began among radio listeners. But then I did not know what awaited me in life. There were joys and sorrows. There were successes and losses of many friends who passed away in the prime of life, but no one canceled illnesses and absurd accidents. But I did not keep a diary and there will be no multi-volume books on the bookshelf. In the next issue we will move to Europe, which also did not stand aside, but this is a completely different story. (Anatoly Klepov, RUS-DX # 1358)

RUS-DX. To the 35th anniversary of the English-language edition. (Part 3)

The 90s. Europe. On the European continent, the DX hobby is popular, there are many clubs and many DX bulletins are published. But here I experienced difficulties, since all printed bulletins were paid and in response to my proposal for cooperation and exchange of information, I was sent letters with a price list for subscription. But I did not have the opportunity to pay these expenses. Everything was not as cloudy as I imagined. But there were also happy exceptions to the rule and I met friendly people.

Since August 1991, I began collaborating with the editor of the Italian newsletter "Play-DX" Dario Monferini from Milan. His newsletter "Play-DX" was popular not only in Italy but also in Europe. Thanks to the publications in the Italian newsletter, I made many new friends. My collaboration lasted for many years until the closure of my printed edition of the newsletter in connection with the transition to an online publication.

The newsletter "Play-DX" completely copied my newsletters and, in connection with this, the number of readers increased. It is a pity that today Dario Monferini cannot read this, who has passed away and his page about the DX hobby is still on the Internet. And it seems that the person has long been gone, but his role in our hobby leaves an extraordinary creative personality with us.

In 1992, information from my bulletin appeared in the German monthly EAWRC Bulletin. We exchanged publications for many years.

In 1992-1994, I began publishing my news and monitoring of radio stations in the USSR and the world in the English edition of "Contact". I had a sponsor there who paid for my presence on the pages of the edition. I had friendly relations with the sponsor and during the entire period of our contacts I sent him several albums of stamps, since he was also a philatelist.

In 1992, notes about my participation in the information support of the magazine also began to appear in the German magazine "Radio Welt".

In 1994-1995, there were publications in the Italian bulletin "Radionews".

In 1997, the Swedish bulletin ARC - Arctic radio Club, published information about radio in the USSR.

Since 1997, the World Radio TV Handbook (WRTH) has mentioned my bulletin and my postal address for contacts. I have come a long way to get on the pages of the most famous reference book among radio amateurs, enthusiasts of radio reception of broadcasting stations, and I considered this a reward for my many years of work and the publication of a bulletin about radio broadcasting in the USSR.

This is very briefly about the time when the Internet had not yet begun to displace paper bulletins and everyone used regular mail and waited for answers to their letters, looked into mailboxes and found new envelopes from all over the world. But technical progress does not stand still. In the early 2000s, computers began to come into use in my life, and gradually the electronic edition replaced the paper version of the "RUS-DX" bulletin.

Another important detail that I would like to note. In foreign DX bulletins from the USSR and Russia there were other authors who published their news, and also led various sections about radio. Perhaps someone would like to tell about this. Time still moves forward and much goes into history, about which not much has been written, as it turned out.

In the USSR and modern Russia, information about radio is presented in the form of scattered publications in the press, memoirs and reviews of programs in Internet archives and on forums dedicated to the history of radio.

I would be grateful for your comments.



Equatorial Guinea has temporarily suspended all amateur radio licenses

DX World has reported that the government of Equatorial Guinea has temporarily suspended all amateur radio licenses. The reason is alleged irregularities in the licensing process, where safety checks and technical specifications were allegedly not correctly adhered to.

The trigger is the current case of Latvian radio amateur Yuris (YL2GM), who, along with Eugene (EA5EL), is accused of allegedly using "unapproved radio frequency technology in sensitive areas" as part of the planned DXpedition 3C0W to the island of Annobón. Despite his previous DXpedition in 2018 and a current license, for which he made payments totaling 531,000 CFA (approximately €810), he encountered massive problems when attempting to go QRV from Annobon. Ultimately, the two radio amateurs returned from the island last week without having accomplished anything.



Before flying to Annobon, they were active for a few days from Equatorial Guinea under the call sign 3C3W and were also easily received here in Bonn.

Vice President Nguema Obiang Mangue, together with the Prime Minister, defense, security, and financial authorities, as well as the regulatory authority ORTEL, chaired the meeting in which the measure was approved.

This means that a very rare opportunity to receive DXCC Annobon has unfortunately been lost until further notice. (Franz Wenzel, A-DX Fernempfang, Google translation)




